My name is Dr. Courtney Diehl and I am an equine veterinarian in Colorado.

In my opinion, the biggest mistake that doctors can make is thinking that science has all of the answers. We do not learn to think outside of the box in medical school, and unfortunately a large part of the information that students are being given is funded and sponsored by the big drug and pet food companies. Our nutrition course actually consisted of a Hill's representative teaching us about the different prescription diets manufactured by the company!

I think as professionals, we must be very careful to use caution when we prescribe drugs or recommend diet changes. Do we REALLY know what we are prescribing or are we regurgitating the interests of others who make large profits off what we are taught to do for our patients?

In my search for other ways to manage cases, I contacted Rowan Emrys. I was working on two horses that I had diagnosed with Cushings disease, a metabolic disorder of the pituitary and adrenal glands, and wondered what else I could do for them besides drug therapy. Rowan recommended some diet changes and was able to give the reasoning for why she would have made these changes. She sent me an article she had written as a follow-up; I appreciated her logic and her knowledge and I reprinted it for the clients. One horse had an episode of laminitis during his drug therapy and it turned out that the owner had not been dosing him properly with the medication and was over-supplementing him, thinking that while some was good, more must be better!

Here is an email I sent to Rowan at the time:

Hi Rowan-

Both horses are doing extremely well. Because they were both so ill, I elected to start them on the Pergolide simultaneously with the feed changes, and back them off of the meds slowly as their systems adjusted to this new feed regimen.
